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

Graduation Requirements

Required 25 credits in the following areas

9 Credits in Humanities, including:

- Four (4) credits in English
- Three (3) credits in Social Studies, including one (1) credit in Civics
- One (1) credit in the Arts
- One (1) credit identified as a Humanities elective in the SHS Course Selection Manual

<u>9 Credits in Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics, including:</u>

- Four (4) credits in Math
- Three (3) credits in Science
- Two (2) credits identified as a STEM elective in the SHS Course Selection Manual

<u>2 Credits in Career and Life Skills, including:</u>

- One (1) credit in Physical Education
- One (1) credit in Life Education (Health)

<u>1 Credit in World Languages</u>

1 Credit in Mastery-Based Diploma Assessment (students must get a 3 or 4 on portfolio by the end of their graduation year.)
3 Credits in Additional Electives

Importance of a Transcript

A high school transcript is a record of your student's academic accomplishments in high school. It lists every class your student took, the year they took it, the grade they earned in each class and the credit awarded. The Quality Point Average (QPA) determines a decile rank. Independent studies, online coursework, ACC partnerships, GHAA, courses take on pass/fail basis, summer school grades and transfer credits are designated with a "T" on the transcript and not calculated towards QPA/GPA.

Students often ask what is the difference between GPA and QPA?

Who sees a student's transcript?

- GPA is calculated by your student's final grade in a class. Highest 4.3
- QPA (weighted GPA is calculated to weight final grades with consideration for level of classes that the student takes (Advanced Placement, Honors, Academic) Highest 5.16
- QPA is what determines a student's decile rank

A transcript is necessary to apply to college and other post-secondary opportunities such as learning a trade or the military. A transcript may be requested by employers during the job application process.

SHS School Counselors meet one on one with each student each year at course request time to develop academic goals related to post-secondary planning. Parents are encouraged to schedule a <u>Pick a Time</u> appointment typically offered in February to meet with your student and students counselor regarding course selections.

Once schedules are complete SHS School Counselors follow up with students to resolve conflicts. All Schedule are typically released in June for the following year.

Athletic Eligibility

Only students who are academically eligible may participate in athletics and extracurricular programs. Suffield High School's eligibility requirements for athletes exceed that of the Connecticut Interscholastic Athletic Conference (CIAC). In order to be eligible to participate in athletics or extracurricular programs, a student must:

- Be enrolled in at least 6 or 7 courses
- Have earned a quarterly G.P.A. of 1.7 or better with no more than one failing grade at the end of the marking period preceding the start of the season
- Maintain a positive standing within the school community. Students found in chronic defiance of school rules per BOE Policy #5144 will not be allowed to participate.

If a student would otherwise be academically ineligible to participate in a fall sport, he or she may regain eligibility through successful completion of summer school. The final summer school grade will be utilized in lieu of the previous quarter grade for that individual subject when recalculating the student's G.P.A. Freshmen entering Suffield High School from the middle school or other sending schools are automatically eligible to participate in fall sports regardless of their academic record in the middle school.

National Honor Society

The National Honor Society (NHS) was created to establish an enthusiasm for scholarship, to stimulate a desire to render service, to promote worthy leadership, and to encourage the development of character in students of the secondary schools of the nation. All students whose Q.P.A. is 3.7 or higher after their sophomore or junior year, as determined by the weighted quality point average system used at Suffield High School, shall be considered for membership in the Sigma Chapter of the National Honor Society. After a student has met this scholarship requirement, he/she is then considered for membership based on three additional qualifications: leadership, character, and service. A vote by the National Honor Society Faculty Council determines the final selection of members.
