Agriscience News-By Ashley Drake

This past week 15 delegates from our Chapter traveled to Indianapolis, Indiana for the 91st National FFA Convention and Expo. These students had the opportunity to learn about different aspects of agriculture from different booths and exhibits as well as other FFA members. There was at least one delegate at the National Convention from all 50 States and Puerto Rico. These students had the ability to learn about ways that other states run their programs in order to bring back helpful strategies to our own chapter.

On Tuesday, all students going on the trip arrived at 4:15 AM at Bradley International Airport in preparation for our departure. We flew from Bradley to Chicago where we had a layover before flying in to Indianapolis. From the Indianapolis airport we were driven by taxi to the hotel where we got time to unpack and settle in. After everyone was settled in we traveled to the Convention Center so that we could register and get a feeling for where everything was. After we did this we went out to eat together at a restaurant called, "Buca Di Beppo". This was a family style restaurant and a new experience for almost every student there. After we ate we walked to the war memorial fountain in Indianapolis where we were able to see a beautiful part of the city. We then went back to the hotel for the night.



On Wednesday we went as a group to the convention center where students were allowed to look around the career show and expo in groups. The convention center career show has many agricultural college booths set up where students can get information about the colleges and what they offer. They also have a large section of various booths from different sponsors of the FFA. These sponsors interact with students at the convention by various games, activities, scavenger hunts and more. We all then got the opportunity to go to Brandywine Creek Farm. All students went on a tour of the farm and listened to the owner about how he maintains such a large, successful farm and the most important aspects of a farm. After dinner we went to the first general session. A general session is a large session open to the FFA members at the convention. These sessions are run by the National FFA officers. The standard session has opening ceremonies (The opening of all meetings assuring all officers are in place and know their duties), awards and recognitions (Competition Results or recognition of sponsors), a retiring address of one of the National Officers, a keynote speaker (Motivational Speaker) and closing ceremonies. After the session ended we attended a private concert for FFA members by Garth Brooks before returning to the hotel.



On Thursday we all went to the convention center to watch one of the Competition Finals that was happening. We split into two groups. One group went to the Extemporaneous Public Speaking Competition where contestants draw a topic and are given 30 minutes to prepare a speech with the materials that they have brought. They then give the 4-6 minute speech to a panel of judges and answer questions that the judges formulate. The other group went to the Prepared Public Speaking Competition where they come with a memorized speech about agriculture and answer questions about it. We then participated in Courtesy Corps for three hours. All students helped open and close doors for the ongoing student workshops and assured that no students entered once the workshop started. After our shift with Courtesy Corps we watched part of the National FFA Talent Show and we watched the third general session.



On Friday all students attended at least one workshop. Our officer team went to a team workshop focused on leadership. At this workshop we did various challenges where we had to work together and we learned new leadership strategies that we can use in our chapter. We then had time to view the career fair and expo one last time before departing for the fifth general session. After we watched the fifth general session we met with the American Degree Recipients that were past graduates of Suffield High School. The FFA American Degree is the highest degree that you can receive within the FFA. Only 5% of members receive this degree but we had four recipients this year which is an amazing accomplishment. This degree is very hard to accomplish and takes an incredible amount of work and dedication to fulfill the requirements. After lunch, with the two recipients who were able to make it, we went with them to the seventh general session.



On Saturday six students attended the American Degree Ceremony with Mrs. LaFlamme. These students cheered on the recipients and let them know what an accomplishment it is to receive this degree. The rest of the students were able to sleep in and pack their luggage before we departed early for our flight. President Donald J. Trump accepted the National FFA's invitation to attend the last general session. Due to his appearance we had to skip the last session to ensure that we would make our flight because of the closing of all highways and roads when he was in Indianapolis. However, in the airport we all watched the live stream of the session on our computers and even saw Air-force One land. We flew

from Indianapolis and had a layover in Baltimore, Maryland before arriving home that night around 11:30 PM.



I believe that all students that attended would agree that this was an incredible experience that they will never forget.

During October we had the first ever FFA Halloween Bash where students attended Browns Harvest and then returned back to the school to meet other members for a party. Currently students are preparing for CDE (Career Development Event) competitions.
